<b>Local Food bank</b>	The Foodbank helps vulnerable people by giving them 3 days of emergency food while they find a long term solution. <b>Bloxwich &amp; Blakenall Foodbank / Black Country Food bank</b>
<b>Save the Children</b>	A charity that exists to help every child reach their full potential. In over 100 countries, we make sure children stay safe, healthy and keep learning.
<b>Captain Sir Thomas Moore</b>	More popularly known as Captain Tom, he was a British Army officer and fundraiser who raised money for charity in the run-up to his 100th birthday during the COVID-19 pandemic.
<b>Tony Hudgell</b>	Young boy who has raised money by completing charity walks despite having both his legs amputated.
<b>UNICEF</b>	An organisation that works in more than 190 countries to reach the most disadvantaged children and adolescents – and to protect the rights of every child.

Key Vocabulary	Definition
<b>Poverty</b>	Not having enough money for basic needs such as food, drinking water, shelter or toiletries
<b>Food Bank</b>	A place where stocks of food, typically basic provisions and non-perishable items, are supplied free of charge to people in need.
<b>Basic Needs</b>	Items necessary for a minimum standard of living
<b>Waste</b>	Food waste is food that could be eaten but is binned/wasted whether or not it is kept beyond its expiry date..
<b>Charity</b>	The voluntary giving of help, typically in the form of money, to those in need.
<b>Fairness</b>	Treatment or behaviour where favoritism is not shown.
<b>Equality</b>	Being equal with rights and opportunities.
